Reviewing Results

On some days you miss the features in the woods, on other days you might misread the map. And some days you get everything right!

In all cases it's fun to share with others. Did they make the same mistakes as you? Did they notice any of the clues that helped you along? This might happen at the finish area, or it might get written online. It might be a subjective judgement, or an objective comparison of GPS tracks (they can be cruel though).

One of the most impressive aspects of orienteering that I have seen is the ability of some to instantly determine that there's an error of some sort. The map is not correct here, or that the control is not correctly



placed. An even greater ability is to find a control that has been misplaced in spite of the error in the map or setter's judgement! Admittedly these don't happen often, but it is still impressive to hear about!

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General Information on Local Courses

The club will no longer be using the OUSA "color" designations, but rather names based on difficulty. A description of the courses is as follows:

Name	Beginner	Advanced Beginner	Intermediate	Short Advanced	Advanced	Long Advanced
Approx. Distance	2-4 km	3-5 km	4-7 km	3-5 km	4-7 km	6-10 km
Number of Controls	4-12	5-12	8-12	8-12	8-12	8-15
Difficulty	Easiest	Easy	Medium	Hard	Hard	Hard

The **Beginner** course is intended to be easy enough for first-time participants after a short introduction to the sport. Control points are generally on trails or similarly easy-to-locate features.

The **Advanced Beginner** course is slightly more difficult than the beginner course. Control points are generally placed close to but not right at easy-to-find features, such as on a knoll that is 50 m away from a trail junction.

The **Intermediate** course requires more map-reading and course-planning skills than the advanced beginner course. Controls will generally have a good attack point, but the attack point may be more subtle than on the advanced beginner course, or the control will be placed further from the attack point. The route choice from one control to the attack point for the next control is often less obvious than on the advanced beginner course.

The **Short Advanced**, **Advanced**, and **Long Advanced** courses differ from each other only in length. At local parks, they are usually the most difficult course that can be set given the size and the terrain of the park. Map-reading, compass, and

route-planning skills will be tested to a greater degree on this course.

Sometimes other courses may be offered, such as a Motala, a course which involves one or more map exchanges, a Trail Challenge (long course with easy control placement), a Line-O or Score-O.

The entry fees to ROC meets are \$6 per map for ROC members and \$10 per map for non-members. If several people enter as a group using the same map, the fee is still \$6 (members) or



\$10 (non-members). There is a \$1 discount if you use Online Registration... see roc.us.orienteering.org. The beginner and advanced beginner courses are \$5 per map. A person or group can do a second course for \$2 additional charge.

Beginner instruction is available at most of our regular meets, and beginners are welcomed to join us!



String O... by Lindsay Worner

String-O is a great way for young children to try out orienteering. The idea being that you don't have to worry about the navigation, you just follow the streamer and 'punch' the controls. It used to be that collected a sticker at each you control. The goal is to have kids moving fast and having fun. With the return of String-O at the Mendon meet, we discovered that it can really be fun for ALL ages. It was a real test of your e-punching speed (as there was no air punching). Do you hold the box in one hand and punch with the other, which finger do you wear the punch on, do you even wear the punch or just carry it, discovering you can punch on either side of the box, running in shoes or bare feet, and remembering to count controls - these were some of the debates that occurred. The results were posted on the wall similar to the old days of punch



cards. The races were tight, only seconds separating the top 5 runners. The younger racers did the course multiple times to try and perfect their punching technique. Even running barefooted was a strategy many youngsters employed! In the end, the winner took 1 minute and 27 seconds! Make sure to try it out at the next event (or sign up to set the course)!

Oatka Creek Park August 6, 2022 Our August 6 event was held at Oatka Creek Park in Scottsville. Course setter Andrew Beckmann created a Score-O and a White course. It was a hot day with high humidity, but there was some relief to be had in the shade of the woods. We set up in the upper parking lot and made the best of the shade provided by the club's Ez-Up canopy.

The White course was dominated by Eamon Capps, who completed the course solo in 35 minutes. Louise Cook received such enthusiastic greeting that she did not start until after the official start window, having been delayed by hugs and conversation. She took a shortcut in order to finish before flag pickup.

On the Score-O there were six entries that cleared the entire course. Soren Lindahl took longer than the 90-minute time limit, and the penalty for being over time pushed him way down in the final results. Zachary Armstrong managed to clear the course in the fastest time, followed exactly one minute later by Tom & Erin Rycroft. It was interesting to note that no two paths were the same for those who cleared all the controls. Rounding out the top ten were "the usual suspects". There were quite a few entries that scored in the mid-300 point range and higher, an impressive result for such a hot and humid day. In the unsanctioned, unofficial and unimportant 30 minute category there were no finishers.

With the added length the courses were able to visit some of the more technical areas of the park. Course setting from East Lodge can sometimes be difficult so Sergey placed the start across the road, meaning there was a walk to the start. Although this is uncommon for our local meets, national and international meets often have walks to the start which can be as long as 5km (longer than the course itself). These longer distances are usually only at very large events in Europe that need to accommodate thousands of runners (yes THOUSANDS). Lindsay Worner held a beginner clinic an hour before the event to give some people more instruction that we usually offer (there is always instruction available at meets, just ask). Air punching was on for the string-o which led to some super speedy times, no slowing down to punch! 35 starts - Big thanks to the Burgeys who stepped up and designed a Score-O for the Webster Park meet. The Burgeys threw in a twist with different point values for the controls so there was definitely some strategy and a 10 point penalty for every minute over time. The String-O headed into the woods a bit and was a hit! We had a scout troop and some of the club regulars complete the course multiple times. Here is a results recap from the Burgeys:

Thank you for participating at the Webster Score-O. First of all, Congratulations to Zachary Armstrong who visited all 29 controls, however, he was back 1:44 minutes late and lost 20 points. Greg Schmidt was 2nd, he visited 26 controls, however he was late by 1:06 minutes and lost 20 points. John Sawyko was 3rd on points and the first that did not go over the 60 minutes. He visited 24 controls. Great job by all that participated.

I was looking over the results and figured I would share what I saw. All the controls were visited by at least 3 orienteers. Number 126 had the most hits with 24, the least visited was 128 with 3 visiting it. When Richard was checking on the control placement the trees were not there, they must have come down in the wind the night before the meet. The other controls on the western side (119, 113, and 125) were visited by only 4 runners. Number 129 had 7 visits. Number 124 and 120 were visited 8 times, and the rest had 10 or more visits. A great day was had by all!

Tick Testing by Laurie Hunt

After a recent meet, I found a tick on the back of my neck in the hairline. Then a second one on my neck two days later after going out in the woods again. FYI if you find a tick on your body you should send it to nyticks.org in Syracuse. They are testing the ticks and gathering data on NYS. The result of my first tick was that it was positive for Lyme and I expect the results on the second any day now. About 32% of the ticks in the state have tested positive for Lyme. My bites are healing well and I think I got the ticks off within a day so I'm not overly concerned beyond informing my doctor. Be careful out there!


